The Spangdahlem community raised breast cancer awareness in a unique way as men and women donned their stiletto heels for a one-mile walk during "Walk In Her Shoes" Oct. 29, 2012.

Spangdahlem Middle School hosted the breast cancer awareness walk, during which participants dressed up and wore women's shoes to raise awareness and money for the Susan G. Komen Foundation.

Participants raised more than \$1,000 with a bulk of the money coming from the 52nd Logistics Readiness Squadron "Vehicle Maintenance Vixens" — a group of men who raised funds by dressing up as women. The more ef'feminately dressed

the "Vixens" were, the more money they raised. Some went so far as to wear fishnet stockings and makeup to raise funds.

"We wanted to participate and find a good way to raise money for breast cancer awareness," said Tech. Sgt. Eric Ford, Vehicle Maintenance Vixen from New Orleans. "We just told people the more money you donate, the more makeup and wigs we'll wear."

Ford's crew of Vixens not only raised money, but also put smiles on survivors' faces at the event.

"It's really great to know you have all this support," said survivor Dorinda Ray from Sequim, Wash., who celebrated her one-year anniversary of survival that day.

Winter is coming

Winter begins Dec. 21; however, the inclement weather it brings has already hit the Eifel region.

The 52nd Fighter Wing and the safety office compiled winter safety tips to help Airmen brave harsh conditions caused by winter weather

Driving

Winter or all season tires are required from Nov. 15 - March 1. It is also German law to have these types of tires on vehicles when driving on icy roads, regardless of the time of year. Winter tires are marked with an "M+S", "M/S" or a snowflake symbol directly on the sidewall of the tire. Studded tires are not allowed in Germany.

People should also watch their speed as black ice, brown ice and slick leaves typically cover winter roads. Speed limits are posted for ideal conditions, so just because 100 KPH is posted does not mean that is the speed people should

drive during inclement weather.

Following distances and speed are very important during freezing temperatures as stopping on frozen roads can take more than twice as long as stopping on wet pavement. People should leave plenty of space between their vehicle and the vehicle in front of them.

The safety office urges people uncomfortable with driving in winter conditions to sign up for the Saber Driving Course through their unit safety manager.

Identifying black ice

People with temperature gauges on their car should check them before driving, because the possibility of black ice forming on the road is much greater if it's 0 degrees Celsius or below freezing outside. Ice may still remain on the road even if temperatures rise above freezing.

People should also expect black ice on bridges, overpasses or in tunnels even if temperatures are above freezing.

USPS holiday mailing tips

The 2012 recommended holiday mail deadline dates for postal customers assigned to the European theater of operations have been released. These dates are for mail originating in Europe and destined to locations in the United States.

The deadlines for various forms of mail are:

- Space available mail is due Nov. 26
 - Parcel airlift mail is due Dec. 3
- Priority and first class mail is due Dec. 10
- Express mail military service is due Dec. 18

These mailing deadlines are issued to ensure postal services can get mail to recipients on time for the holidays, said Master Sgt. Melvin Graham, 52nd Communications Squadron post master.

The Spangdahlem post office also recommends customers follow these mailing tips:

- Print or type address information clearly with a pen or permanent marker. Avoid punctuation as it helps mail speed through USPS automated processing equipment.

- Include all address elements such as apartment numbers, suite numbers and directional information for streets.
- Put the delivery and return addresses on only one side of the package.
- Select a box that is strong enough to protect the contents. Leave space for cushioning inside the carton.
- Package contents with shredded or rolled newspaper, bubble wrap, or other protective cushioning. Plain air-popped popcorn is also good for cushioning; it's inexpensive and environmentally friendly.
- Always use tape that is designed for shipping, such as pressure-sensitive tape, nylon-reinforced tape, paper tape, or glassreinforced pressure-sensitive tape.
- Stuff glass and fragile hollow items, like vases, with newspaper or packing material to avoid damage due to shock. When mailing framed photographs, take the glass out of the frame and wrap it...
