Warhawks get manning assist from Triple Nickel

"You can't walk into the Super Bowl with a new team," said Master Sgt. Brian McRory, superintendent of 480th Fighter Squadron, Spangdahlem Air Base, Germany. "The team has to have worked together and have chemistry."

That is what Red and Green Flags are doing for the 480th FS and the 555th Fighter Squadron from Aviano Air Base, Italy.

Due to a unit inactivation at Spangdahlem, the 480th FS had a manning void that was filled by 50 Airmen from Aviano.

"We welcomed them into our family," McRory said. "These Airmen have been going to dinners and outdoor activities with each other to get to know one another."

"We knew coming into a different unit that we would have to work hard to show we could work to their standards," said Staff Sgt. Michael White, a crew chief now assigned to 480th Aircraft Maintenance Unit. "It's a brotherhood."

Red and Green Flag exercises give Airmen the opportunity to train in realistic combat scenarios. "It's important to practice like you're going to play," White said, "I feel our Airmen and their Airmen have learned a lot from each other, and I feel they're really focused on what the mission is down range now."

The two exercises give Airmen with little to no experience the opportunity to work with people who have more experience in a training environment before they have to perform in a deployed location.

"The exercises give us the opportunity to say, 'you have never done this before, go train on it with someone who is proficient," McRory said. "We aren't trying to push jets as fast as we can. We are taking our time and putting out combat ready jets."

The fighter squadron heads back to Germany when the exercises are done.

"All of our Airmen should feel extremely proud of their accomplishments; they have worked exceptionally hard this month producing [more than] 400 sorties, loading 57,000 pounds of precision guided munitions, and [more than] 20,000 20 mm rounds," said Lt. Col. Cameron Caroom, 480th FS commander.

At this event local ladies dress up and fight for the symbolic key to the city. Once the ladies seize the key, they are in charge of the town for that day.

In most German cities and towns, including Bitburg, Wittlich and Speicher, it is a tradition for the ladies to 'capture' the local Rathaus or city hall and take over the city key from the mayor on Fat Thursday at 11:11 a.m. Typically, a band plays special Fasching music and the women serve beverages and traditional Fasching treats.

Don't let the flu get you

The peak of the flu season is just around the corner, and signs from the U.S. Center For Disease Control indicate people are experiencing more flu-like symptoms this year than last year.

The CDC tracks influenza activity year-round.

According to the CDC, the amount of people in the United States seeing their health care provider for influenza-like illnesses climbed to 5.6 percent compared to 2.2 percent last year.

Some symptoms of the flu include but are not limited to coughing, runny nose, nausea and vomiting.

"If you are sick, stay home," said Tech. Sgt. Brian Schmit, 52nd Medical Operations Squadron allergy immunizations technician from Rogers, Ark. "Coming in to work would just increase the likelihood of the virus spreading."

Another way to prevent the spread of the flu virus is through immunizations. The immunizations clinic offers an inhalable mist, and injected vaccination to combat the flu. As of mid December, members of the Spangdahlem community are unable get the mist until next flu season due to its long shelf life, but the injected vaccination is only available until June 2013.

Some of the common side effects from the mist include runny nose or nasal congestion, fever, sore throat, cough and aches. The side effects for the injected vaccine include soreness, redness or swelling where the shot was received, fever, aches or cough.

The vaccines protects members of the Spangdahlem community from two type A and one type B flu strain, including this year's most prevalent strain the H3N2. However, people must remember to get the vaccine every year for the most up-to-date protection.

"People need to remember if there is a new strain, the previous year's vaccine doesn't protect you," said Maj. Anthony Davis, 52nd Aerospace Medicine Squadron Public Health flight commander from Alton, Ill.
