TA available in face of AF suspension

he U.S. Air Force suspended military tuition assistance March 11 due to ongoing Defense Department budget cuts.

As of now, the branch will no longer accept any new financial-aid requests from Airmen who need help paying for college.

"All is not lost here, and how (Airmen) approach this is important," said Chief Master Sgt. Matthew Grengs, 52nd Fighter Wing command chief. "They have a choice to let this derail their educational goals or to become even more determined to meet their goals despite increased difficulty."

Airmen who are currently enrolled in college and already have approved tuition assistance remain unaffected and will receive their financial aid. Air Force senior leaders encourage all others to seek out alternative aids, such as grants, applicable G.I. Bill benefits, scholarships or state tuition assistance. Direct testing for college credits using programs like

CLEP and DANTES is available for free as well.

"Believe me, this was a tough decision, because our Air Force truly values education," said Chief Master Sgt. of the Air Force James Cody about the challenges Airmen may now face. "We remain as committed as ever to ensuring Airmen have the opportunity and means to pursue educational goals."

There is no date as to how long the suspension will be in place, but in the meantime, Spangdahlem Airmen can visit the base education office to speak with an education counselor.

"Everybody's situation is different," said Cedric O. Rodgers, 52nd Force Support chief of education and training. "We can offer suggestions for the way forward in the mean time -- that's what we're here for. This is not the end; see which alternative best fits your situation now and use it in the time before we get tuition assistance back.

"We're here to support every Saber out there; just come see us," he said.

U.S.-Polish air forces improve interoperability with exercise

POWIDZ AIR BASE, Poland -- Members of Aviation Detachment 1, 52nd Operations Group, received more than 60 U.S. Air Force and Army personnel and C-130J Super Hercules aircraft from the 37th Airlift Squadron, Ramstein Air Base, Germany, for Exercise Screaming Eagle V.

The exercise tests the skills and interoperability of U.S. and Polish air force C-130 pilots and aircrew onlow-level flying, air assault, unimproved landing zone and drop zonetactics techniques and procedures.

According to U.S. Air Force Capt. Luke Waschovich, Screaming Eagle V deputy mission commander from the 37th Airlift Squadron, training here allows aircrew members, maintainers and support staff to work closely with their Polishair force counterparts to fine tune their skills while strengthening their relationship as NATO allies.

with the Polish in events such as this allows us to deploy with our NATO partner to areas such as Afghanistan and hit the ground running because we already understand each other's strengths and weaknesses," said Waschovich of Hershey, Pa. "We don't have to spend days trying to figure out the basics of how to fly with them. Screaming Eagle V sets us up for suc-

cess because we understand each others' culture and mindset,; we can just go and get the mission done."

Before members of the 37th arrived in Poland and started flying, 10 individuals assigned to the Av-Det laid the ground work for the exercise. The Av-Det personnel handled everything from determining the facilities in which aircrew and maintainers would work, to hotel arrangements and rental cars

Hosting an exercise this large wouldn't have been possible without the Av-Det'scontinued presence in Poland. Since its establishment in October 2012, as a result of a Memorandum of Understanding signed by the Polish Minister of Defense, Av-Det members have been working non-stop to help further the United States' commitment to Poland as a NATO ally.

"The Av-Det's role is to essentially act as a liaison between the U.S. Air Force incoming unit ...

Employee recalls importance of helping Airmen through Airman's Attic

Prenda Jones has stored up story after story in her "attic" of how the Spangdahlem Airman's Attic has provided for Airmen and families since she signed on to be a volunteer there.

"Gosh, so many stories," Jones said with a laugh.

Jones is the coordinator of the Airman's Attic, which provides donated items at no cost to help Airmen who are in various situations such as move-ins, move-outs, baby arrivals and even airline luggage loss.

"One of my favorite stories is a young Airman who lost his entire blues set," she recalled. "It was Thursday and he needed blues for Monday. I said, 'Are you aware we have a military room?' He said, 'You have a what?' So I brought him down and showed him. He was like a kid in a candy store. He was just so happy. We set him up with his blues, and I mean everything from the coat, the shoes, the straps, everything. Even the stripes were right so he didn't have to have any sewing done. These blues fit like they were made for him. And I have lots of happy stories like that one. I really do."

Their military room, a room set aside next to the Airman's Attic in the basement of the temporary lodging facility, has dress blues, ABUs, tan t-shirts, physical training uniforms, shoes, boots and just about every uniform item an Airman needs.
