726th AMS stays mission ready

The 726th Air Mobility Squadron serviced six cargo aircraft in late July which was a first of its kind event.

Each aircraft was from a different base, which encompass the total force, involving active duty, Reserve and Air National Guard aircraft bound for operations in support of U.S. Transportation Command.

"It's definitely the first time that we had all three here at one time," said U.S. Air Force Capt. Todd Murray, 726th AMS Maintenance Flight commander from San Antonio. "We get tails from the Reserve and Guard in and out frequently, but to have them here all in one day, it was pretty amazing."

The aircraft received en-route support from the 726th AMS under the 721st Air Mobility Operations Group and 521st Air Mobility Wing, a tenant unit supported by the 52nd Fighter Wing. The 52nd FW provides support to transient aircrew and service members around the globe.

"Our mission here at the 726th AMS is to support US TRANSCOM and Air Mobility Command, and that has to do with mobility, moving missions to and from the desert," explained Murray. "The tails that come through here don't have the Spangdahlem tail flash, they're from the states and they're bringing supplies, service members, bullets, beans to the desert or back home from the desert."

Four of these aircraft departed with 278,035 pounds of cargo, 48 people and a critical AC-130

part destined to support contingency operations in CENTCOM. These four aircraft also safely delivered 79 military, family and retired members to their final destination here at Spangdahlem Air Base.

Two of these aircraft returned from CENTCOM on the way back to the United States carrying 32 service members, in addition to 53 space-available passengers and more than 104,000 pounds of cargo.

The mission is important; it gets aircraft to where they need to be.

"Right now, our country is still very heavily involved overseas, and as we try to move them back home, we are going to need a boat-load of aircraft to help support that retrograde out of Afghanistan," said Murray. "If operations shift to somewhere else, then we need to have those assets ready to be placed somewhere else."

The 726th AMS team consists of 159 Airmen, civilians and temporary-duty personnel.

who completed the missions in support of these aircraft. The squadron is unique by the simple fact that it maintains all three core competencies -- aircraft maintenance, aerial port, and command and control -- under one command.

When a cargo aircraft lands, the 276th AMS is set into action to ensure the plane is airworthy to make it to its next destination.

"When an aircraft comes to us, if it's broken, then we will fix whatever we need to fix," Murray said. "The crew dictates what they would like fixed, and we can tell them right away if we are able to or not."

Sabers and honored guests from all walks of life came together to participate in the fifth annual Diversity Day celebration Aug. 22, 2013, at Club Eifel.

Diversity Day is a culmination of nine observances normally recognized throughout the year rolled into one day to celebrate the different cultures that make up the Air Force today.

"(Diversity Day) was something we initiated five years ago because what we were seeing was that during certain cultural heritage months, only that particular group of people would attend those events," said U.S. Air Force Master Sgt. Jasmine Barnes, 52nd Fighter Wing Equal Opportunity specialist from Houston. "We wanted to educate people outside of that culture, and Diversity Day was the best way to do so."

African-American/Black History Month, Women's History Month, Asian Pacific-American Heritage Month, Hispanic Heritage Month, National Disability Employment Awareness Month and Native-American Heritage Month are among the nine observances Congress has mandated all military installations throughout the Department of Defense recognize each year. They were also among those present at Diversity Day 2013.

According to Barnes, the goal of Diversity Day is to enhance cross-cultural and cross-gender awareness and promote harmony among all military members, their families and the civilian work force.

"The Air Force really highlights diversity as one if its strengths, because if you look around any work environment, you'll see people from all different walks of life," Barnes said. "Whether it is a person of a different color, a different culture, a different gender, diversity is something that in America, we just cannot escape. What Diversity Day brings to the table is that it gives people the opportunity to learn about the (cultural) backgrounds of others in an effort to bring us a little closer so that we can improve our working relationships and prevent so many conflicts."
